

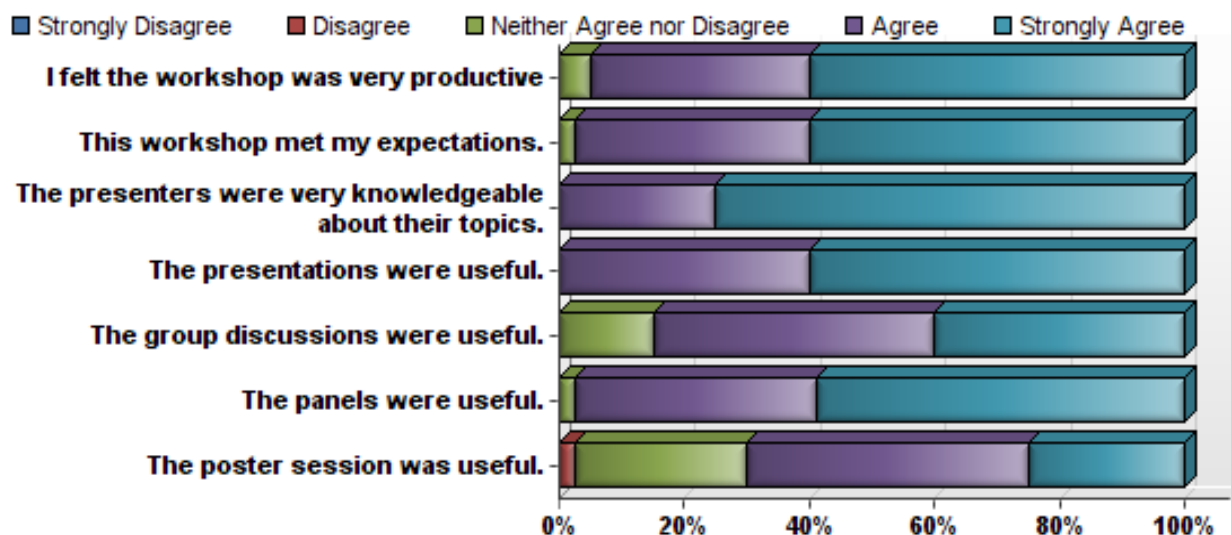

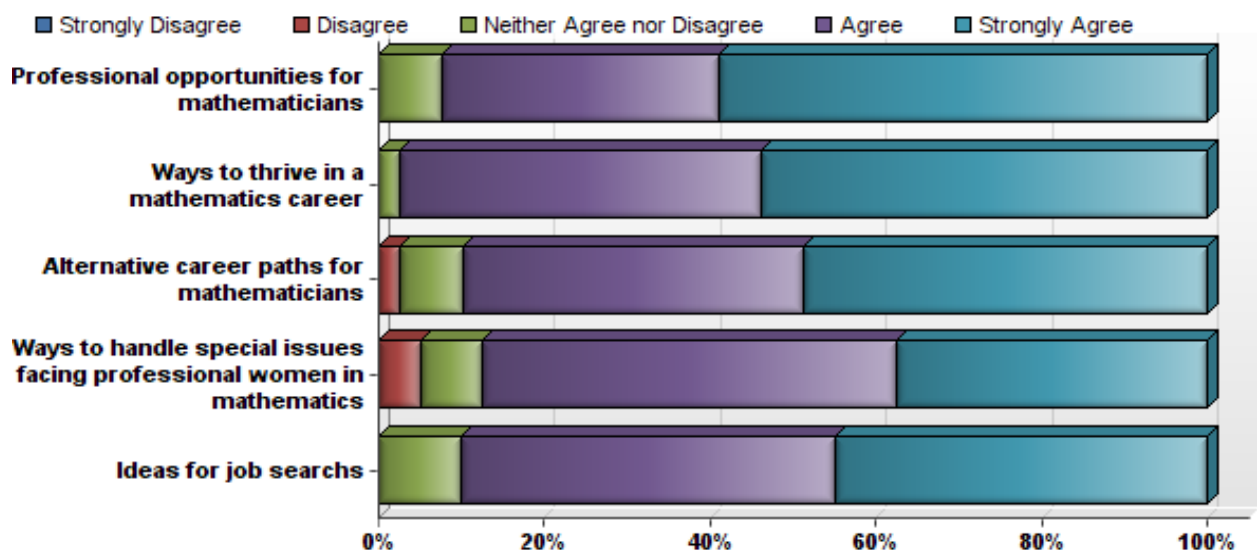

Comments:

Job search and interview talks were very helpful. We were able to talk about challenges for women in a way that we could only address in an all women workshop.

Though the workshop discussed many useful opportunities for mathematicians and how to explore them, I felt that I already knew most of what was discussed.

There are a lot of topics in the breakout sessions that interested me. But because of the limited amount of time we had, I was not able to attend all sessions that I was interested in.

3. What do you feel was the most useful aspect of the workshop?

The networking aspect of the workshop was best.

The size was perfect - a wide variety of people but still small enough that you could have meaningful conversations with other participants and the speakers. It was nice that the speakers all stayed during the day so you could strike up conversations with them organically.

Speaking with other professional mathematicians in industry.

I gained knowledge from people worked in the academic and industry. It shows me the possible choice for future. It also helped me build network.

Having the opportunity to hear professionals from all aspects of academia and industry.

4. What would you change about the workshop?

It was nice that we had input into the breakout group discussion topics, but the process of organizing where they would be held and such got a little hectic. Some of them also seemed a bit rushed.

Nothing!

Panels were interesting, but questions only came from the audience, with almost all answers given by panelists. Would have been a plus to have a broader discussion where others could add their insights as well.

The focus seemed mostly on academic career choices, but I have already decided not to pursue an academic career. I would have focused the workshop more evenly between academia and industry.

Invite more famous speakers.

I think the workshop need more time; maybe can ask more students to bring their posters.

Unfortunately a few speakers cancelled and it hinders the panels and a talk time. The organizer did a great job adjusting to the circumstances.

Longer breaks. Smaller groups for the discussions. There were lots of senior people, who all had lots to say. There could have been more focus on individual people's issues if we had split into smaller groups.

More time to talk informally with the industry folk. Since it was on the last day and they were rushed to get out of there, it felt like there wasn't time to network with them as much as everyone else there.

Could the workshop be 1 more day longer? Invite more people from various cultural backgrounds.

I would like to see more minority women involved in the panels/talks and organizing the workshop.

It would have been nice if days during the workshop didn't end quite so late even if it meant stretching it out over another day or starting earlier on Wednesday.

The second day was very long. Maybe move to a different room for some of the presentations.

I might begin with the Breakout Groups or some other activity that has people talking to each other and getting to know the others. I think it was hard for the speakers who had to go first. The environment was more friendly and relaxed for the speakers on the second and third days. Running the workshop Thurs to Sat might be easier for those needing to cover MWF classes.

Everything was great. Perhaps the breakout sessions can be organized a little bit better.

If anything I would have liked a schedule a little less intense. It was nice because every minute was packed full of useful information, but I felt the pace was tiring.

Group's discussions needed more structure and guidance to avoid degenerating into individual therapy sessions.

Nothing, I thought it was very well done.

Over half of the graduate students indicated that they were interested in jobs that are primarily teaching, but MOST of the panelists and speakers were from heavy research positions. It would have probably been more helpful to bring in more people from teaching schools, and including someone from a small liberal arts school on the tenure panel.

More grant representatives from NSF and other groups -- and maybe more time to chat with speakers -- and introductions to people with similar interests...for example, I was the participant from ORNL, and would have been glad to have that tagged to my name. People were able to find me anyway, but I had trouble finding people from, say, a grad school I was interested in.

I would have more math talks. And a longer poster session.

Nothing much. I like if I got the chance to attend all the group meetings during the lunch time as I liked all the topics.

Group discussions during lunch break. I would have more discussions after the group meetings. Of course I understand there was a time constraint.

There isn't necessarily anything that I would specifically change about the workshop itself, but I would have found it useful to have a list of professional organizations that are out there, either from the professional development (e.g. Project next) or professional organization (e.g. AWM) side of things. There was a lot of good information given during the various panels and talks, but it might be useful to provide workshop participants with a list and very short description of these opportunities for a quick reference. This could potentially just accompany the pamphlets that were provided in the workshop classroom.

I wouldn't want to change anything other than perhaps making it longer in order to get a stronger grasp on the subjects discussed and build stronger relationships with the wonderful people I have met.

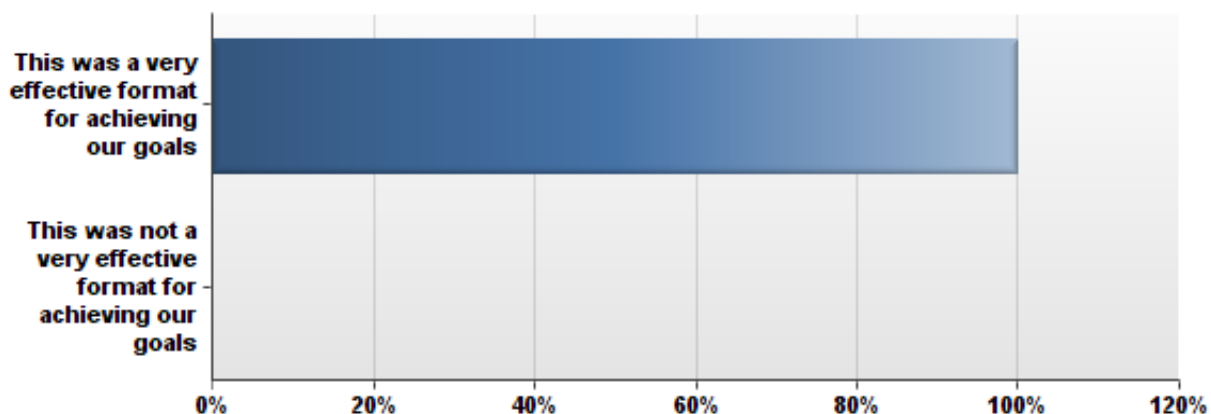
The first day was a bit tiring since we worked/met straight through dinner into the evening

Add a discussion of government jobs for mathematicians.

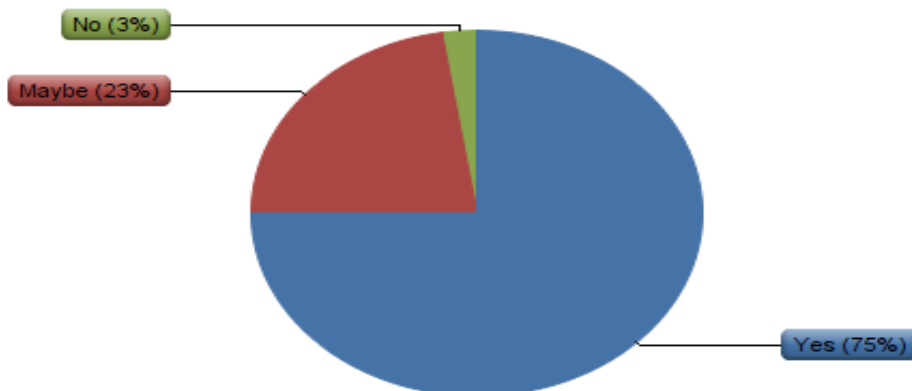
5. How do you feel about the format of the workshop?

The networking aspects of the workshop were an invaluable resource.

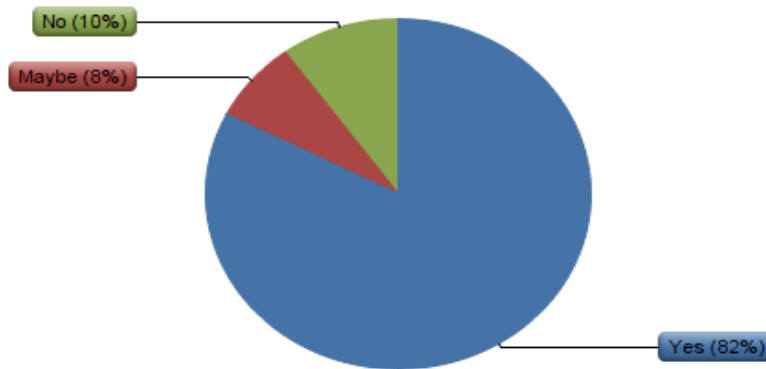
I learned about the tenure process and what I should look for/ask about when I look for a tenure track job.

I found it extremely useful and important to hear about other women's career trajectories, particularly

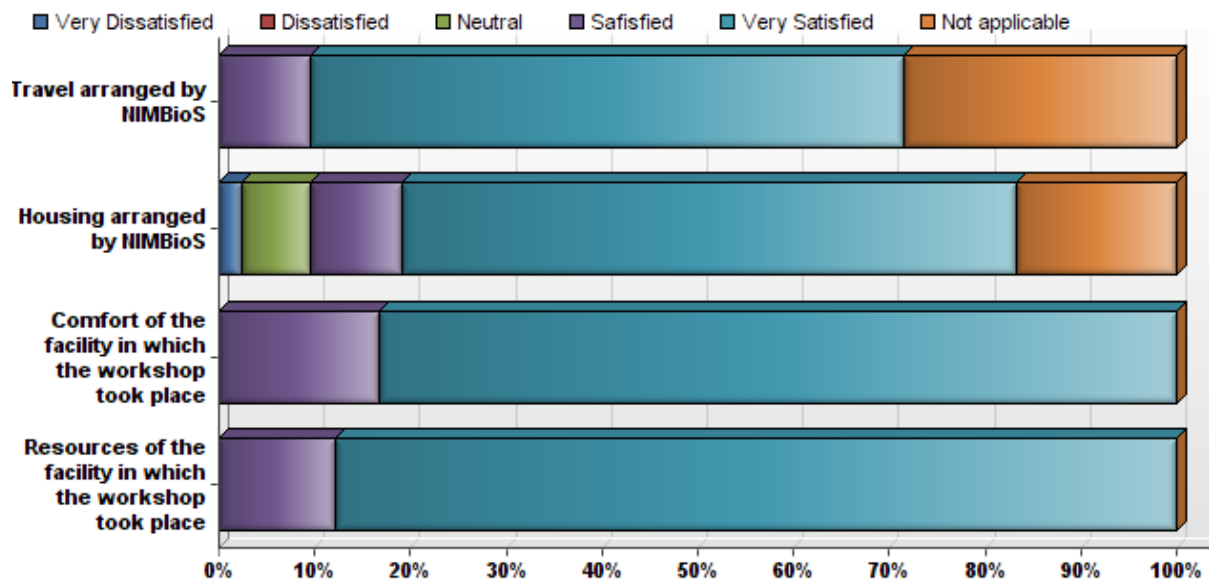

8. Please indicate your level of satisfaction with the workshop accommodations:



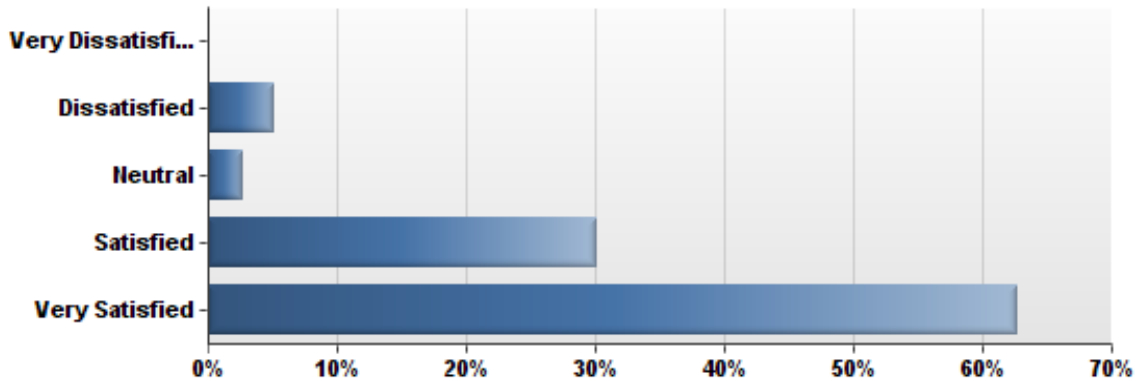
Comments about accommodations:

Please indicate any suggestions you have for facilitating communication among participants during the workshop:

Passing the microphone almost inhibited conversation because participants could not speak freely. However, I think it's necessary for the live stream.

Not enough time was left for questions. The schedule was really full. I suggest paring down the schedule - shorter math talks would be fine. It would be so wonderful to have more time to interact with individuals who spoke or who have questions.

Maybe some opportunities or ice breaker activities at the beginning of the workshop to get to know the other participants better.

Some concerns that certain individuals were dominating the questions. Perhaps ask participants to submit questions in advance to start off the panel discussions (still allowing time at the end for additional q's)

Loved this workshop, thought it was incredibly useful/helpful for careers. With a few minor tweaks, I think it could be even more useful. Might have more of the presenters give some short presentation early in the conference, so people know what they do, what to ask them about. For some of the talks on the last day, there wasn't time to discuss/talk to the speakers. And the talks can all be shorter. 20-25 minutes of speaking, 5-10 minutes for questions would be good.
